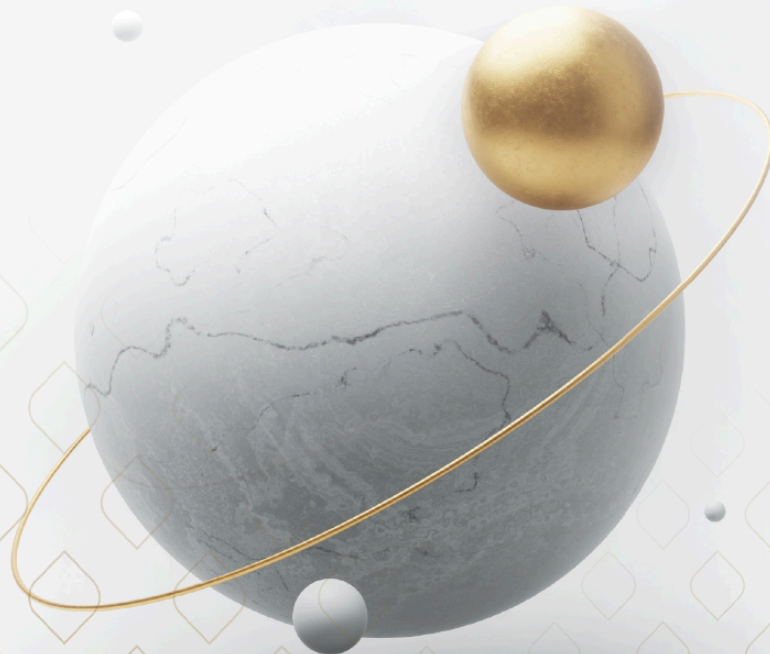


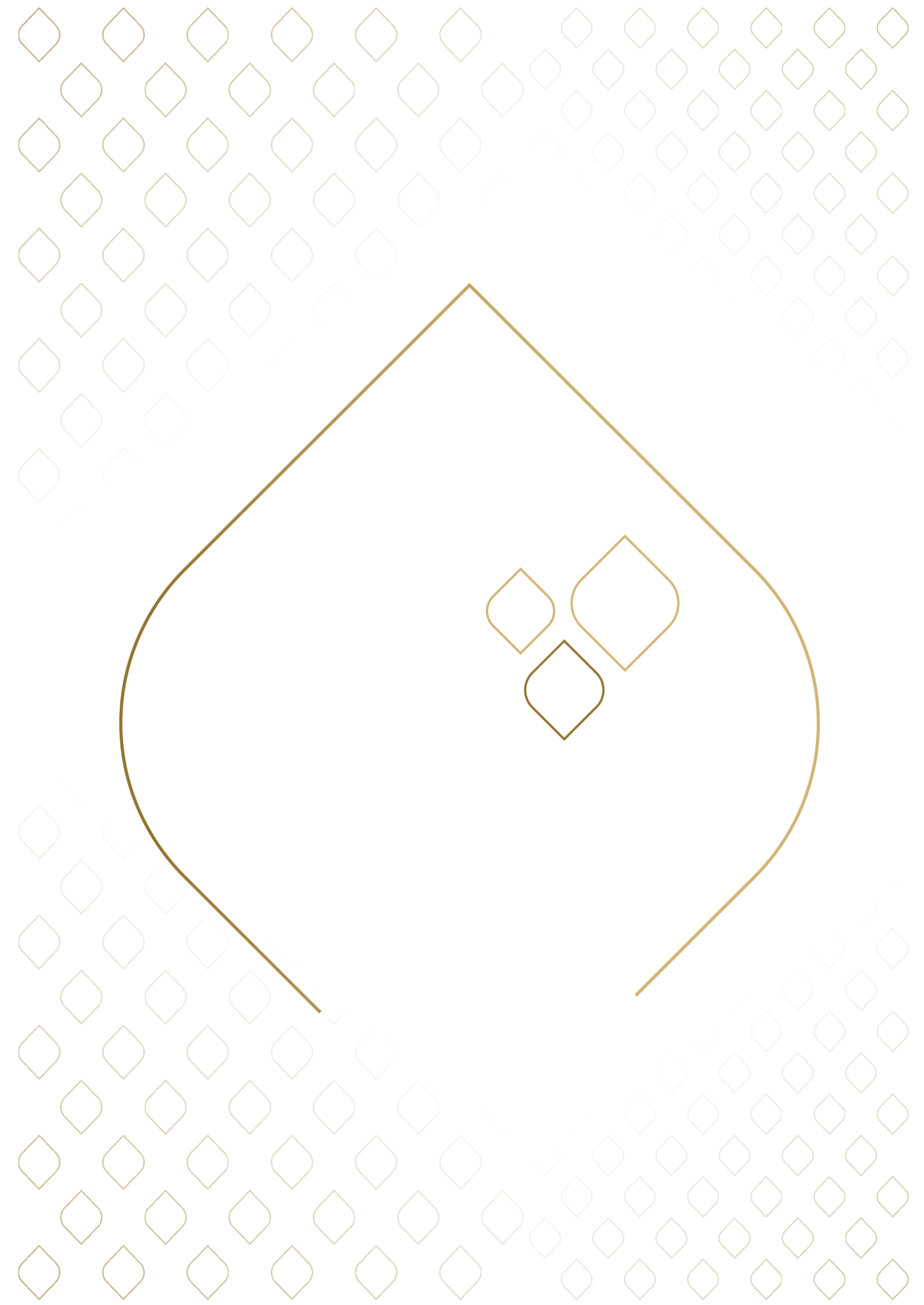

This produced a distorted epistemological framework—interpreting the human being as merely an economic, psychological, biological, or social entity, while ignoring his innate wholeness as a free, responsible, vicegerent being—governed by a unique universal order, and connected to his Creator, just like every other system embedded in the universe.

This reductionism created a vast civilizational gap:

We advanced in tools, but regressed in purpose.

The earth filled with objects... but was emptied of meaning.

Wealth turned into spiritual poverty.

Technology became isolated.

Comfort bred disorder.

And at the very heart of material civilization, the human being became the first victim of his own hands.

In contrast to this fundamental flaw in the Western civilizational model, the Islamic Ummah possesses a comprehensive existential and universal worldview—one that

surpasses the material Western paradigm in depth and coherence, because it originates from revelation and aligns with human nature (fiṭrah).

If this worldview is properly harnessed to uncover the universal laws that govern the self, society, and the arc of human history, then we will possess a civilizational energy equal in force to that which was unleashed through the discovery of physical laws that transformed the earth.

In fact, this energy will be even more lasting and impactful—because it will restore balance to the human being, liberate civilization from its compounding crises, and awaken within the Muslim mind an unprecedented capacity for righteous civilizational action.

This is what the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) and his noble companions achieved: they altered the course of history within a single generation and brought about the greatest strategic transformation in human life.

We are not reinventing the wheel.

We are simply setting it in motion once again.

The Structure of Universal Construction

Because the source of existence is one, and because Allah Almighty is the Creator of all things, as He said in His noble Book: sa

(اللَّهُ خَالِقُ كُلِّ شَيْءٍ)

[Az-Zumar: 62]

“Allah is the Creator of all things.”

(Surah Az-Zumar, 39:62)

The structure of the universal order—with all its diversity—is marked by astonishing harmony in its design, dynamics, and system, no matter how different its scales, dimensions, or functions may be.

Every system in the universe—from the atom to the galaxy—operates according to a recurring, divine logic:

A center that attracts, orbits that revolve, and a balance sustained only through gravitational pull toward the center.

The atom has its nucleus, which acts as the gravitational center for its smaller components.

The solar system has its sun, which maintains the harmonious orbit of its planets.

And the galaxy has an immense gravitational core that regulates the motion of stars and planetary systems within it.

The closer a component is to the center of its system, the stronger, more stable, and more coherent its movement becomes.

The farther it drifts from the center, the weaker and more erratic it becomes.

And when a component detaches from the farthest orbit linked to the central gravity, it collapses and vanishes from the system entirely.

This precise dynamic, which governs balance in the material universe, also governs the human system—but on a deeper and more complex level.

Just as the physical order has a center that attracts its parts, the human order has its own gravitational center: **the fiṭrah**—the innate disposition that Allah embedded within every human being from the moment of creation.

The fiṭrah is the core of human identity, the internal force that draws the self toward meaning, truth, goodness, and justice.

The closer human behavior revolves around this center, the more coherent, stable,

and capable it becomes.

The farther it moves away, the more disturbed, fragile, and weak it grows.

And when it drifts beyond the furthest orbit of connection to the fiṭrah, it collapses on a human level—becoming a being alienated from its existential order.

In this sense, the individual human system can be likened to an atom, society to a solar system, and civilization to a galaxy.

But the essential difference is that physical systems operate on a closed, deterministic path—

While the human system operates on an open, voluntary path, because man has borne the trust of responsibility and vicegerency, a burden from which all other creatures recoiled, as Allah Almighty said:

إِنَّا عَرَضْنَا الْأَمَانَةَ عَلَى السَّمَاوَاتِ وَالْأَرْضِ وَالْجِبَالِ فَأَبَيْنَ أَنْ يَحْمِلْنَهَا وَأَشْفَقْنَ مِنْهَا وَحَمَلَهَا الْإِنْسَانُ
إِنَّهُ كَانَ ظَلُومًا جَهُولًا

[Al-Aḥzāb: 72]

“Indeed, We offered the Trust to the heavens and the earth and the mountains, but they declined to bear it and feared it; but man undertook it. Indeed, he was unjust and ignorant.”

(Surah Al-Aḥzāb, 33:72)

Man is the only creature in the universe with the freedom to choose either alignment with his center or detachment from it.

But this freedom does not imply chaos or lawlessness—

Rather, it means that man operates within a divinely structured system, governed by universal laws that determine the outcomes of his actions and trajectories, whether on the individual, societal, or civilizational level.

This comparison between physical laws and human laws is not a symbolic metaphor— It is a foundational key for understanding the universal laws that govern human behavior and historical movement, and for generating effective, sustainable civilizational models—not just in economics, but across all fields of life.

Standards of Universal Construction

Allah created the universe according to a precise system of standards and laws, as He said:

(صُنِعَ اللَّهُ الَّذِي أَنْقَنَ كُلَّ شَيْءٍ)

[An-Naml: 88]

“[This is] the work of Allah, who perfected all things.”

(Surah An-Naml, 27:88)

These standards and laws that govern the universe are not merely physical equations or causal mechanisms. At their core, they are manifestations of Allah’s Most Beautiful Names and Supreme Attributes.

The universe—with all its precision, balance, beauty, and vastness—is but a small trace of these Names and Attributes, a reflection of their absolute standards imprinted in every atom of existence.

Justice is the standard that maintains balance in the systems of the universe.

Wisdom brings gradation and places everything in its proper place.

Beauty radiates splendor in every universal scene.

Mercy envelops creation with gentleness and grace.

Knowledge ensures precision and mastery in creation and decree.

Gentleness and forbearance regulate the rhythm of time and the space for reprieve.

As for Oneness (Tawḥīd), it is the supreme standard affirming God’s absolute uniqueness and imprinting the cosmos with duality and dependence upon Him.

And since the human fiṭrah (innate disposition) is also a creation of Allah, these divine standards are embedded within human consciousness.

They form its inner gravitational pull and shape the innate sense of right and wrong, justice and oppression, beauty and ugliness, mercy and cruelty.

Each of Allah’s Most Beautiful Names represents a divine standard, and each standard is a universal law.

This law—like all divine patterns (sunan)—carries within it an active dual force:

- **The first direction is alignment:** moving in harmony with the divine law, which generates real energy that leads to growth, cohesion, and elevation.
- **The second direction is violation:** deviating from the divine law, which causes a counter-effect of decline, disorder, and decay.

This dual effect is precisely captured in the Qur'an when Allah says:

(فَمَنْ يَعْمَلْ مِثْقَالَ ذَرَّةٍ خَيْرًا يَرَهُ، وَمَنْ يَعْمَلْ مِثْقَالَ ذَرَّةٍ شَرًّا يَرَهُ)

[Az-Zalzalah: 7–8]

“So whoever does an atom’s weight of good will see it, and whoever does an atom’s weight of evil will see it.”

(Surah Az-Zalzalah, 99:7–8)

Every action—whether aligned with or deviating from these divine standards and universal laws—has an accumulative impact, whether it is seen in the moment or builds across the flow of history.

Thus, a "global debt bubble" has formed, inflating day by day without being backed by tangible value or real production. As a result, all of humanity—governments, corporations, and individuals—is sinking into a sea of interest-bearing debt with no realistic capacity to repay it.

The rapidly widening gap between production and debt is not merely an accounting discrepancy, but a serious structural indicator that the global economy is operating outside the bounds of natural balance, sustained by a digital illusion rather than real value.

This is why the central question in the "Tamkin" vision is not just a rhetorical inquiry, but a clear call to reassess prevailing assumptions:

Is what we see around us truly a real economy? Or is it merely a system bloated with numbers, bankrupt at its core?

Existential Contradiction at the Heart of the Global Economy

What was supposed to be a temporary tool to stimulate growth has become a permanent model for managing the economy. Debt is no longer used solely to finance real production but is now recycled to serve itself and to extinguish the crises that the system itself has ignited.

This brings us to the "crucial question" raised by Tamkin:

How did usurious debt become the lifeblood of capitalism, while at the same time, its lethal poison?

This contradiction is not a fleeting economic detail; it is the largest structural flaw in the global economic system, and it calls for a rethinking of the model from its roots, inspiring the world to create a new economy... a real economy.

It is a system that makes money from money... and then gets trapped in a "debt to serve debt" spiral, where what is produced is not enough to pay back the principal of the debt, let alone its interest. And here, the capitalist equation becomes deadly: every crisis is addressed with bigger debts, and every expansion is financed with deeper deficits, until markets are managed with financial sedation rather than economic healing.

What some once thought was a disease at the periphery of the global economic system has now become a malignant tumor at the centers of its power:

The United States: A Model of Usurious Inflation

- GDP in 2023: 27.36 trillion dollars.
- Total debt (governmental, institutional, individual): 63.24 trillion dollars, which is 235% of GDP.
- The U.S. debt alone accounts for 20.6% of global debt.
- Around 9 trillion dollars of U.S. bonds will mature by 2025, with a decline in the appetite of international investors, particularly China, which has reduced its

holdings of U.S. bonds from 1.3 trillion to 0.8 trillion dollars in less than a decade.

All of this means one thing: the U.S. economy is on the edge of a financial cliff.

China: The Dragon Burdened by Chains of Debt

- Its GDP in 2023: \$17.79 trillion.
- Total debt: \$51.2 trillion, 288% of GDP, making up 16.7% of global debt.
- More than \$5.2 trillion of that is real estate company debt suffering from the housing market collapse crisis.

China is paying the price for the "debt-driven growth" model, risking internal explosions that could destabilize the global financial system.

Capitalism's Strongholds Collapsing from Within

- Japan: Debt-to-GDP ratio exceeds 260%, and reliance on the central bank to buy debt has reached its limit.
- France, Britain, Italy: All face public debt ratios over 100%, with slow growth and high interest rates consuming most budgets.

Mathematics doesn't lie... The equation of financial collapse.

- The global debt growth rate currently: 6.2%.
- The global GDP growth rate: 2.3%.
- This means debt doubles every 11 years, while GDP needs 30 years to double.

The inevitable result: debt swallows value... and collapse is just a matter of time.

- The current financial system has lost its ability to renew itself.
- Stimulus mechanisms (such as lowering interest rates or quantitative easing) have been exhausted.
- Restructuring is politically impossible in light of the interests of financial elites, and the cold economic war fueled by usurious debt.

The disaster is not limited to major economies alone; it strikes more than 3.3 billion people in developing countries who live between the hammer of debt service and the anvil of social collapse.

- In 54 countries, the payments for usurious loan interests exceed the combined spending on education and health (World Bank report).
- The middle class in developed countries is crushed under housing, education loans, and credit card debts, with no pensions, no guarantees.

And if major economies today are collapsing from within, the question is no longer:

"Will the capitalist system collapse?"

But rather: "How much time is left before it collapses?"

The Fall of Communism: How It Accelerated the Collapse of Capitalism

When the communist system collapsed at the end of the 20th century, it seemed as if capitalism had achieved a total victory. The belief prevailed in Western capitals that history had ended, and the capitalist model was the natural endpoint of human evolution. Thus, in the East, a “development model” was born that threatened to surpass the West from within the capitalist system itself.

At that point, the West had no choice but to cling to its position at the top of the global race, and the only way to achieve that was through massive doses of debt.

This structural instability is not only a punishment in the Hereafter, but an inevitable worldly consequence of deviating from the balance of justice and equilibrium in the economy.

Capitalism does not need an external conspiracy to collapse, nor a war to bring it down...

It only needs to continue on its current path—because that very path leads to its downfall.

The universal law cannot be deceived, and collapse is not a conspiracy theory, but a natural result of a trajectory that violates the laws of the universe.

But rather: *How can we draw inspiration for a new economic model—one that restores human dignity, gives meaning to work, a message to money, and a purpose to development?*

The global economic crisis is merely a manifestation of a deeper problem:

- A flawed perception of the human being and their role in the universe.
- A flawed perception of money, work, and development as ends rather than means.
- A rupture between economy and values, between markets and human nature.

Therefore, true change does not begin with fixing tools, but with rebuilding conceptions and planting the roots of a new vision in the intellectual and spiritual soil of the world.

A vision that does not stop at criticizing capitalism, but offers an alternative—one that emerges from God’s universal laws, from the womb of human nature, and from the light of divine values.

{And We have certainly honored the children of Adam and carried them on the land and sea and provided for them of the good things and preferred them over much of what We have created, with [definite] preference.}

[Al-Isra: 70]

He was offered the great trust that the heavens, the earth, and the mountains shrank from bearing—yet man accepted it by his own will and choice:

{إِنَّا عَرَضْنَا الْأَمَانَةَ عَلَى السَّمَاوَاتِ وَالْأَرْضِ وَالْجِبَالِ فَأَبَيْنَ أَنْ يَحْمِلْنَهَا وَأَشْفَقْنَ مِنْهَا وَحَمَلَهَا الْإِنْسَانُ إِنَّهُ كَانَ ظَلُومًا جَهُولًا} [الأحزاب: ٧٢].

{Indeed, We offered the Trust to the heavens and the earth and the mountains, and they declined to bear it and feared it; but man undertook it. Indeed, he was unjust and ignorant.}

[Al-Ahzab: 72]

The human being's primary function is not to chase desires, but to fulfill the greater purpose of his existence:

{وَمَا خَلَقْتُ الْجِنَّ وَالْإِنْسَ إِلَّا لِيَعْبُدُونِ} [الذاريات: ٥٦].

{And I did not create the jinn and mankind except to worship Me.}

[Adh-Dhariyat: 56]

And worship here is not limited to outward ritual acts—it includes every action that aligns with justice, excellence, and the cultivation of the earth in accordance with divine values.

The human being is a vicegerent on earth, entrusted to build and develop it according to God's laws in creation:

{وَإِذْ قَالَ رَبُّكَ لِلْمَلَائِكَةِ إِنِّي جَاعِلٌ فِي الْأَرْضِ خَلِيفَةً} [البقرة: ٣٠]

{And [mention] when your Lord said to the angels, "Indeed, I will make upon the earth a successive authority."}

[Al-Baqarah: 30]

{هُوَ أَنشَأَكُم مِّنَ الْأَرْضِ وَاسْتَعْمَرَكُمْ فِيهَا} [هود: ٦١].

{It is He who produced you from the earth and settled you in it.}

[Hud: 61]

Thus, the human being is commanded to uphold the balance of justice, observe the laws of harmony—not to indulge in corruption, excess, or servitude to desire.

2. Money: A Trust, Not an Idol

In the Qur'anic perspective, money is a trust entrusted to human beings. It was created to serve as a means for establishing justice and development—not as an end for domination and accumulation.

Allah says:

{وَأَتَوْهُمْ مِّن مَّالِ اللَّهِ الَّذِي آتَاكُمْ} [النور: ٣٣]

{And give them from the wealth of Allah which He has given you.}

[An-Nur: 33]

And He also says:

{وَأَنْفِقُوا مِمَّا جَعَلَكُمْ مُسْتَخْلِفِينَ فِيهِ} [الحديد: ٧].

{And spend from that which He has made you successors over.}

[Al-Hadid: 7]

Thus, money must be managed with the mindset of a trust held by humans and accountable to God—not with the logic of absolute ownership, greed, or avarice.

3. Work: Worship and Development

In Islam, work is a form of worship through which one draws nearer to God, and a path to cultivating the earth and establishing a civilization of justice:

{هو أنشأكم من الأرض واستعمركم فيها} [هود: ٦١]

{It is He who produced you from the earth and settled you in it.}

[Hud: 61]

Work is not merely a means to increase consumption or amplify profits—it is an elevated act of faith that connects the earth to the heavens through sincere intention and excellence in action.

Honorable, productive, and excellent work is part of the identity of the believing human being, and it is the gateway to achieving true development.

4. Development: Balanced Construction Aligned with Universal Laws

In Tamkin's vision, development is not a frantic race over resources nor a destruction of nature, but a balanced movement inspired by the harmony upon which the heavens and the earth were established:

For this reason, *Tamkin* believes that building a real economy is not an intellectual option—it is a civilizational necessity dictated by the laws of the universe and the cours of history.

Features of the Real Economic System

The world is in need of a new economic model—one that emerges from universal laws and aligns with divine values; one that restores the human being to their true role as a steward on Earth, not a cog in the machinery of blind consumption.

The real economic system that *Tamkin* seeks to inspire the world with is not measured solely by numerical growth, but by its harmony with human nature, its balance with values, and its contribution to building a civilization that establishes justice—between a person and their own self, between human beings, and between humanity and the nature entrusted to them.

{وَلَا تُؤْتُوا السُّفَهَاءَ أَمْوَالَكُمُ الَّتِي جَعَلَ اللَّهُ لَكُمْ قِيَامًا} [النساء: ٥].

{And do not give the weak-minded your property, which Allah has made a means of sustenance for you.}

[An-Nisa: 5]

Money was created to uphold life: to elevate the human being, support their dignity, and establish society on a foundation of balance and mutual support.

2. That it not be hoarded by a small group, but circulate among all segments of society.

Allah says:

{كَيْ لَا يَكُونَ دُولَةً بَيْنَ الْأَغْنِيَاءِ مِنْكُمْ} [الحشر: ٧].

{So that it will not circulate solely among the rich among you.}

[Al-Hashr: 7]

Righteous money moves the wheel of life in all directions—not in one direction from the poor to the rich—preventing the accumulation of wealth in the hands of a narrow elite that withholds the benefits of money from the broader society.

3. That it establishes complete justice in transactions—without oppression or exploitation.

Allah says:

{فَلَكُمْ رُؤُوسُ أَمْوَالِكُمْ لَا تَظْلِمُونَ وَلَا تُظْلَمُونَ} [البقرة: ٢٧٩].

{You shall have your capital sums; do not wrong others, nor shall you be wronged.}

[Al-Baqarah: 279]

Justice is the soul of every financial transaction in the real economic system—no one wrongs, and no one is wronged.

Thus, righteous money is not a lifeless mass to be hoarded, but the lifeblood of the economy—flowing through the body of society to grant it healthy growth, not diseased inflation.

And for money to remain righteous, it must stand on three essential pillars:

- **First:** That it is generated from real, beneficial production—not from speculative bubbles or usurious loans.

- **Second:** That it is managed as a trust, entrusted to serve humanity and the universe—not as a tyrannical power.
- **Third:** That it is governed by the divine balance of justice and mercy—not by the blind whims of the market.

In light of this deep understanding, righteous money becomes:

- A tool for dignity, not a means of domination.
- A bridge to development, not a net of enslavement.
- A servant to human nature, not a master over humanity.

Thus, money regains its lost purpose, becoming the cornerstone upon which a new, real economy is built—an economy that pulses with justice, grows within the realm of values, and cultivates the earth with truth and balance.

Second: Building Fair Financial Systems — From Partnership-Based Financing to Cycles of Reconstruction, Not Cycles of Debt

At the heart of every economic system lies the financial system—its lifeblood. When channels of finance are corrupted, the entire body decays; but when they are sound, the economy grows healthy and whole.

That's why *Tamkin* believes that building a real economy is impossible without first creating new financial systems and channels—ones that redefine financing not as a debt trap, but as bridges for reconstruction and genuine partnership.

The global financial system has suffocated because its foundation is based on usurious logic:

- Loans issued with compounding interest,

- A natural economic cycle emerges:
Financing and partnership lead to production.

Conscious consumption breathes life back into the arteries of labor and production.
- This breaks the dependency on debt expansion as a driver of growth and reconnects economic growth to actual productive realities.

In a word:

The Qur'an beautifully encapsulates this distinct vision in the verse:

[Al-Baqarah: 275]

Trade represents the cycle of production, exchange, and constructive development—

While usury represents a cycle of exploitation, instability, and eventual collapse.

True trade—rooted in production and fair exchange—is what God blesses.

Whereas usury—draining the weak and corrupting the economic cycle—is the forbidden force that drags both wealth and society toward ruin.

Where usurious cycles breed dependency and eventual breakdown, Tamkin-style cycles lead to human liberation and the unleashing of creative potential.

In this light, *Tamkin* believes that building fair, integrated financial systems is the first practical step toward constructing a real economy—

And launching a values-based revolution that restores money to its rightful place:

A tool to liberate humanity and ignite its potential—

Third: Effective Integration of Productive Forces

Just as the biological continuation of humankind depends on the complementarity of its two sexes, the survival and flourishing of human civilization depends on the degree to which its productive forces achieve integration and balance.

God, in His justice and wisdom, has distributed the elements of power among people: No one possesses everything, and no one is left with nothing.

One person has ideas, another has effort, a third has capital, a fourth brings experience, and a fifth carries passion...

This divine distribution makes the pursuit of effective and just integration not merely an ethical choice—but a *universal necessity* upon which the life of societies and the growth of civilizations depend.

Any attempt to monopolize power without seeking fair and effective integration with those who *rightfully* possess it is a violation of the universal order—and ultimately leads to societal dysfunction and civilizational collapse.

Here lies the fundamental difference between the Tamkin vision and the capitalist worldview:

- Capitalism glorifies **radical individualism**—pushing the strong toward dominance and the weak toward exclusion.

{وَلَا تُفْسِدُوا فِي الْأَرْضِ بَعْدَ إِصْلَاحِهَا} [Al-A'raf: 56]

{وَالسَّمَاءَ رَفَعَهَا وَوَضَعَ الْمِيزَانَ} [Ar-Rahman: 7–8]

These verses do not describe a passive universal scene. They lay out an active divine law:

Any excess in resource usage, any disruption of nature's balance, is a form of corruption on earth—even when disguised under slogans like “development” or “economic growth.”

This is where the deep flaw of the capitalist model is revealed—its growth built on the exhaustion of nature:

- Forests cleared for industrial expansion
- Massive pollution of air, water, and soil
- Ruthless consumption of non-renewable resources
- Climate change threatening the very future of life

Capitalism has turned the earth into a commodity, the environment into a collateral cost, and the balance of nature into a statistic buried in profit-loss tables. Development became synonymous with destruction, expansion with combustion, and progress a mask for existential threat.

In contrast, Tamkin's vision sees the real economy not as an enemy of nature, but in harmony with it:

- Real production must not pollute—it must align with natural systems
- Consumption is not reckless waste—it is conscious need, within resource limits
- Profit is not measured by factory output alone—but also by the life it protects

Therefore, an environmentally balanced economy rests on three central principles:

Fifth: The Balance Between Consumption and Production

In the Tamkin vision, real economic strength is not measured solely by the quantity of goods and services produced, but by the degree of balance between production and consumption—between needs and desires.

Economic balance is not a mathematical equation; it is a value-based, universal framework that governs market behavior just as it governs human behavior.

When that balance is disrupted—when excess consumption or uncontrolled production dominates—the entire cycle of economic life collapses, just as the human body fails when one system overwhelms the others.

This imbalance lies at the core of the capitalist model, where consumption has shifted from a natural response to an engineered addiction, and production is no longer used to meet needs, but to provoke endless desires—in a frantic race for profit, even at the expense of human dignity and the environment.

In sufficiency, not luxury;

In reverence for blessings, not their abuse.

In Tamkin's philosophy, consumption is not the goal of life, but a conscious act governed by wisdom and moderation.

1. Purposeful Production:

It is production that delivers real benefits to people and serves their essential needs—not production obsessed with volume and superficial appeal.
